Australian Standard 4707:2014 is an adoption of the PEFC International Chain of Custody Standard PEFC ST:2002. PEFC ST 2002 was revised in 2020.

To maintain mutual recognition with other PEFC endorsed Chain of Custody Standards and to facilitate the global trade in Australia grown sustainable wood products, it is necessary to align AS 4707-Chain of Custody for Wood Products to the most recent version of PEFC ST:2002-Chain of Custody for Forest and Tree-Based Products.

Failure to update AS 4707 will result in the loss of mutual recognition for wood products processed and traded under AS 4707:2014 in the 52 Countries participating in the PEFC mutual recognition system. These Countries include major trading partners such as Japan, China, USA, Canada, UK and members of the EU. PEFC has provided guidance that to maintain recognition, National CoC Standards must be aligned to PEFC 2002:2020 by February 2022.

- **b.** Take feedback from Stakeholders and further amend AS 4707 in response to this feedback.
- **c.** Review requirements for due diligence provided in AS 4707 to ensure they remain consistent with key Australian legislation i.e. the *Illegal Logging Act*.
- **d.** Review definitions to ensure the Standard continues to meet community expectations for excluding controversial forest products from wood product supply chains.

Section 2: Net benefit

Public health and safety (max 200 words)

The Standard provides best practice requirements for OH&S in timber processing and merchandising facilities. Performance against these requirements are independently audited by accredited and competent Certification Bodies.

The overall benefit is a positive improvement in workplace safety.

Social and community impact (max 200 words)

The Standard supports and facilitates the sourcing and distribution of forest products from forests meeting Australian Standard AS 4708-Sustainable Forest Management. AS 4708 has mandatory requirements designed to improve social and community benefits, especially in those rural communities where forestry makes a significant contribution to the local economy. AS 4707 supports a sustainable forest management system that provides positive social and community impacts.

Environmental impact (max 200 words)

The Standard is intended to support the processing and trade of forest products originating from sustainably managed Australian forests. The Standard also provides mechanisms for the labelling and identification of sustainably sourced wood products.

In identifying sustainably sourced forest products, consumers are able to make a conscious choice to choose products associated with more positive environmental practices. This helps create demand for responsibly sourced forest products and lessens negative environmental impact by the increased use and market acceptance of sustainably grown materials. AS4707 allows Australian grown sustainable forest products to compete more effectively with substitutes that contribute to or are associated with negative environmental impacts.

Competition (max 200 words)

AS 4707 provides for the clear identification of products of sustainable origin.

This allows the value of sustainability to be captured and allows Australian grown and processed products to compete in an open market against lower cost products from less environmentally responsible sources. It differentiates products on the basis of environmental impact and allows competition on the basis of value including environmental benefits, rather than solely on price.

AS4707 increases competition and improves transparency.

Economic impact (max 200 words)

The Standard identifies products from responsible and sustainable sources and differentiates these products from products from less sustainable sources. This allows the economic value of sustainability to be realised through greater market acceptance, and in some cases premium pricing.

In some forest product markets, sustainability is a mandatory condition for entry. The revised AS 4707 provides evidence of sustainability and provides market access to significant and important markets.

AS 4707 underpins the PEFC national recognition system in Australia. The revised and updated Standard is a requirement to maintain this mutual recognition and provides access to large and critical export markets.
